Just like a Book Fair... Made Simpler Online!

At Great Hollands Primary School, we aim to encourage children to develop of love of reading for pleasure and we have now started our own Scholastic Book Club!



This is very exciting as you can go online to order books for your child, just as you would if you visited the book fair in school previously. You pay for your order online and the books you have chosen are then delivered to school, with no delivery cost.

When you visit the page, you will then:

- Choose the age range you are buying books for
- Browse the shop and click the green 'Buy' icon to add to your basket
- When you go through the checkout, choose our school to add your purchase to the school group order and click the 'Dispatch order to school' option when it will ask for your child's name and class, for when books are delivered to school.
- Book tokens can be redeemed online in the checkout,
- You will receive a confirmation email from Scholastic and when we receive the books in school, we will send them home with your child.

Each purchase via the online link will earn us rewards so we can purchase lots of new, exciting books for the children to enjoy.

Talking with Children about Ukraine

As hostilities continue in Ukraine, children may see and hear things in the news, which may lead to feelings of anxiety, uncertainty and fear. They may not fully understand what is happening in Ukraine and have questions about images, stories and conversations they are exposed to. Save the Children have shared five tips to help approach the conversation with children:

- Make time and listen when your child wants to talk
 Give children space to tell you what they know, how they feel and ask you questions.
 They may have formed a completely different picture of the situation than you have.
 Take the time to listen to what they think, and what they have seen or heard.
- 2. Tailor the conversation to the child


Be mindful of the child's age when talking to them. Young children may not understand what conflict or war means. Be careful not to over-explain or go into too much detail as this can make children unnecessarily anxious. Younger children may be satisfied just by understanding that sometimes countries fight. Older children are more likely to understand what war means and will often be more concerned as they tend to understand the dangers better than younger children do.

- 3. Validate their feelings
 - It is important that children feel supported in the conversation and should not feel judged or have their concerns dismissed. Having an open and honest conversation about things upsetting them can create a sense of relief and safety.
- 4. Reassure them that all adults all over the world are working hard to resolve this
 Remind children that this is not their problem to solve. They should not feel guilty about
 playing, seeing their friends, and doing the things that make them happy. Stay calm
 when you talk to them, as children will often copy the sentiments of their caregivers. If
 you are uneasy about the situation, chances are your child will be uneasy as well.
- 5. Give them a practical way to help
 Support children who want to help. Children who have the opportunity to help those
 affected by the conflict can feel like they are part of the solution. Children can create
 fundraisers, send letters to local decision makers or create drawings calling for peace.
