Behaviour for Learning expectations

We continue to be impressed with the positive attitude to learning, the children's resilience and the GREAT Behaviour for learning we have seen across the phase both in school and at home. Below is a reminder of the expectations for all children.

Remote Behaviour for Learning expectations:

- You will all remain muted unless you are asked to unmute to answer a question or your teacher unmutes you.
- Everyone is listening and tracking the teacher while they are talking
- You can only private message the teacher.
- If behaviour expectations are not being followed, your teacher will give you a
 warning. If the behaviour has not improved you will be moved into the waiting
 room to reflect on what changes you are going to make when you are invited
 back in.
- If there is too much background noise from home then you might also be placed in the waiting room.

Learning covered this week in school and online

Year 3

This week, Year 3 have continued improving their skills as mathematicians and have completed some excellent work on multiplication, including writing multiplication equations, solving problems using column method multiplication and exercising their mathematical reasoning and problem-solving skills.

In Grammar, Year 3 have explored the use of punctuation in direct speech in the story of King Midas and have been revising using 'a' and 'an' correctly. In Spellings, we are learning where to use and how to spell words with the 'c' sound written 'ch'

Year 3 have enjoyed writing this week, continuing with the story of King Midas and have ordered and drawn the scenes in the story. They have used their Reciprocal Reading skills to answer questions and predict what may happen in the story. They have also been practicing writing direct speech with the correct punctuation.



Reading this week has been all about 'The Railway Children'. The children have been making predictions about the text, justifying their predictions, making links to other texts using prior knowledge, checking their understanding of what they have read and asking questions about the text.

History has been particularly exciting with the children discovering that we have our own Bronze Age Round Barrow Monument site in Bracknell, called Bill Hill! Some of the children are planning to visit it when they go out for exercise.

The work has been amazing both last week and this week and we would like to share some with you to celebrate how well everyone is doing:






Harry (Kestrels) has used his knowledge about the Stone Age to order date cards to create a timeline, well done Harry!

Year 4

Another week in lockdown has come to an end and we would like to thank you all once again for your hard work and support to make online learning in Year 4 so successful. We are thoroughly enjoying seeing the children each day and keeping the line of contact open with both you and them.



This week we have continued our multiplication learning in maths. We have identified ways to efficiently answer multiplication calculations and have used those ways to multiply a 2-digit number by a 1-digit number. We have then used this information to begin to identify ways to divide by a 1-digit number.



We have been compiling our own instruction manuals in Year 4. Writing recipes and gaming manuals for beginners. The children have entered the invent phase of our writing cycle and have been very creative with their instructions. We have focused on imperative verbs (bossy verbs) to support their writing.

In Spellings, the children have been focusing on the prefix sub. Writing the prefix sub before the root word changes the meaning of the word to mean below, beneath or under. For example: Marine means of the sea, so submarine means beneath the sea.

In Grammar the children have been identifying apostrophes for possession and identifying whether the apostrophe is singular or plural and where it will go within the word.



In our reading sessions we have been working on the skill of retrieval, identifying the answers within the text we have been reading.

During our afternoon topic sessions, Year 4 have been continuing their Geographical learning. We have identified where the country of Greece lies within the Earth, which continent and which hemisphere it is in. We have made fact files and information posters to share our knowledge of Greece as a country and the traditions we have learnt about.



In PSHE we have been looking at feelings and emotions, using the film Inside Out to show that our mind is made up of several emotions and it is okay to feel these emotions. We have been learning about how we can support ourselves when we are feeling negative emotions and who to talk to when we are feeling upset or down.




There has been some amazing work shared with us this week linked to our Topic work on Greece, we're delighted to share a selection of this with you.
