


## Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar

- A Spelling test is administered containing 20 words, lasting approximately 15 minutes.
- A separate test is given on Punctuation, Vocabulary and Grammar
- This test lasts for 45 minutes and requires short answer questions, including some multiple choice.
- Marks for these two tests are added together to give a total for Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar.

# Reading

- The Reading Test consists of a single test paper with three unrelated reading texts.
- Children are given 60 minutes in total, which includes reading the texts and answering the questions.
- A total of 50 marks are available.
- Questions are designed to assess the comprehension and understanding of a child's reading.
- Some questions are multiple choice or selected response, others require short answers and some require an extended response or explanation.

# Maths

- Children will sit three tests: Paper 1, Paper 2 and Paper 3.
- Paper 1 is for 'Arithmetic' lasting for 30 minutes, covering calculation methods for all operations, including use of fractions, percentages and decimals.
- Questions gradually increase in difficulty.
- Papers 2 and 3 cover 'Problem Solving and Reasoning', each lasting for 40 minutes.
- Pupils will still require calculation skills but will need to answer questions in context and decide what is required to find a solution.





## **Scaled Scores**

A scaled score is set by the government. This changes every year. On publication of the test results in July 2024:

- A child awarded a scaled score of 100 is judged to have met the 'national standard' in the area judged by the test.
- A child awarded a scaled score of more than 110 is judged to have exceeded the national standard and demonstrated a higher than expected knowledge of the curriculum for their age.
- A child awarded a scaled score of less than 100 is judged to have not yet met the national standard and performed below expectation for their age.

# **Receiving Results**

For the Reading, GPS and Mathematics tests you will receive:

- a raw score (total marks awarded)
- a scaled score (a comparable score for each subject)
- confirmation of whether or not they attained the national standard

Writing is teacher assessed. For writing, you will be told if your child is:

- Working at expected standard
- Working at greater depth standard
- Working towards expected standard.

# Extra Support

- Will be administered in small groups with familiar adults.
- Some children will do the tests 1:1.
- Readers will be provided and children should ask for any question they don't understand to be read aloud.
- Staff can use their discretion to decide if the pupils require a break during any of the tests or, if they need to stop earlier.
- Calm, supportive atmosphere.

# How Parents/Carers Can Help

- Ensure your child is in school everyday.
- Make sure they have a quiet organised place to do their homework, with necessary equipment.

- Reassure them that as long as they do their best that is all that matters.
- The tests are a way of showing what they know, not catching them out.

Every May, towards the end of their time in primary school, year 6 children throughout the cou the key stage 2 SATs tests. These are standardised tests to evaluate your child's progress th stage 2 (years 3 to 6) and to compare your child's attainment against the expectations for th (see our KS2 SATs Results: Guide for Parents for further information). Opinion is divided on v the best way to assess children's ability in school, but it is nevertheless vital that children are h the SATs process without undue stress or anxiety.

The impact of SATs varies depending on the school environment children are in, but it is impo to remember to keep calm, to try their best and not to panic! Below, you will find a list of su can do to help your child stay calm and relaxed throughout the SATs period.
